Small steps toward being prepared for an emergency

Make a Plan

The goal: Understand what puts you at risk from disasters and take steps to lower your risk.

Disasters change things. When an emergency happens you may have to decide what to do very quickly, while you are worrying about what might happen. By planning ahead, it will be easier to make the right decisions when the worst happens.

Choose one of the following things to do this month to become better prepared:

~ Learn what disasters can happen in your area and decide what you will do in a disaster.

It is important to know what types of disasters can happen where you are to help you prepare. Is your home in a floodplain? When are tornadoes most likely to happen? Are you susceptible to winter storms?

Meet with family members to discuss how to prepare and respond and the responsibilities of each household member.

~ Take steps now to prevent damage to your home in a disaster.

Add a tornado safe room or extra protection to an existing room. Reference FEMA publication 320 for more information.

Remove/secure outdoor items that may blow around in the wind. Check your roof, visually, for loose shingles to have repaired by a professional.

Elevate your water heater, furnace and electrical panel to minimize damage during a flood.

~ Plan what to do if you have to evacuate.

Choose two places for your family to meet. One should be right outside of your home. The other should be outside of your neighborhood, in case you cannot return to your home or are asked to evacuate.

Decide where you would go and what route you would take to get there. You may choose to go to a hotel, stay with friends or family in a safe location. Hold evacuation drills at home. Practice getting out of the house quickly and drive your planned evacuation route. The more you practice, the more confident you will be if you really have to evacuate.
